Mount Royal University is located in the traditional territories of the Niitsitapi (real people) and the people of Treaty 7 which includes the Blackfoot — Siksika, Piikani, Kainai — the Tsuut'ina, and the Îyârhe Nakoda.



Program eligibility

Self-declared Indigenous ancestry (First Nations Status or Non-Status, Métis and Inuit).

Academically prepared for Math 10C and English 20-1 or higher. Please note English 20-1 is only offered in the Fall semester.

To complete the application process, you will need to submit the following:

- IUBP application, (online, mru.ca/IUBP)
- transcripts from outside of Alberta (high school and/or post secondary)
- transcripts from public institutions within Alberta (high school and/or post secondary) will be obtained for you

Mount Royal University establishes competitive averages each year for all credit programs. You can find your competitive averages on the Admission Requirements website.

Indigenous Admission Targets

As part of Mount Royal's commitment to indigenization, we reserve several seats in most credit programs for Indigenous students. We want to ensure a proportionate representation. Anyone who self-identifies as First Nations —Status or Non-Status, Métis or Inuit will be considered for one of these seats if they meet the minimum grade requirements but not the competitive average.

Group A, B and C

A competitive average is formed by taking an applicants' top two grades in the Group A course category.

Find out your band's application process and deadlines. Every First Nation has a post-secondary program that can answer your questions and provide application forms.

Foundational Learning Assistance

The Foundational Learning Assistance program is a provincial bursary. You must be a Canadian citizen with a valid Social Insurance Number and an Alberta address and be at least 18 when starting school. Applicants must also have an Alberta Student Number (ASN) and have completed the most recent tax return available. While the bursary is intended for those unemployed or working less than 20 hours per week, a Counsel to Leave Employment can be obtained for anyone working more than 20 hours per week and needs to reduce their employment to attend classes. Only non-credit courses are sponsored by this funding.

Indigenous Housing Program

The Indigenous Housing Program provides culturally supported and affordable single-room and family units for students who self-identify as First Nations, Métis, Non-status or Inuit. Students qualify for housing based on academic readiness, academic and career goals, and financial need.

Frequently asked questions

You said there is family housing, but is there on-campus daycare?

Yes, there is a daycare on campus and the Iniskim Centre has reserved spots for the Indigenous Family Housing students. Learn more about fees and closures.

How much does a unit cost?

Living in residence makes it easy to pay for housing while attending Mount Royal — one payment per semester covers your accommodation and all utilities (WiFi, heat, water, and electricity). Learn more about housing fees.

What about parking?

There are parking spots reserved for family housing students. When you apply for residence, on the online application there is a place to apply for parking. Learn more about residence parking.

Is there a deadline to apply for the Indigenous Housing Program?

We accept students on a first come, first served basis. There is no set deadline, but register once you have been accepted into the Indigenous University Bridging Program.

IUBP students taking one credit course automatically have a membership included in their fees; students taking non-credit courses will be offered a membership.
