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Sustainable development is "development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs"

(World Commission on Environment and Development, 1987, p. 41).

The 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) are:

Community Prosperity

- A call to action
- A global, shared vision for the future
- Endorsed by the United Nations (UN) and its 193 member states
- · Interconnected and complex

(Division for Sustainable Development Goals [DSDG], n.d.-b)

- Part of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development
- Usable by every sector as well as individuals (Division for Sustainable Development Goals [DSDG], n.d.-b).

Data


- Data is needed to evaluate success of solution efforts for the SDGs
- More data is needed to identify consistent synergies and conflicts with SDG targets (Magendane & Kapazoglou, n.d.)
- As of 2021, Canada has a strategy (Statistics Canada, 2021) and funding program (Employment and Social Development Canada [ESDC], 2021) in place for achieving the goals.
- STARS Aligned (Kistner et al., 2020) and the SDG Accord (Alliance for Sustainability Leadership in Education, 2021) are two means of progresstracking in post-secondaries

PEOPLE PLANET PROSPERITY PEACE PARTNERSHIP

Themes: people, planet, prosperity, peace and partnerships, and "Leave no one behind" (General Assembly, 2015) ... Yet Indigenous Peoples are already being left behind (Littlechild as cited in Doherty, 2021).

The SDGs should be **localized** to prioritize a community's needs for that particular context (Nilsson et al., 2018).

- Research -> policy, dataoriented solutions, and progress reports (ESDC, 2021d).
- Shape future leaders
- Challenge usual ways of thinking (El-Jardali et al., 2018).

- Data gap for location/context
- Data gap for SDG interactions
- · Lack of systems thinking tools
- Lack of basic education on the SDGsLack of shared knowledge about university's current

 Surface-level Change on the SDGs (Struggling to Implement Transformational Change) in Universities

Trends/Patterns

- · Excluded stakeholders
- Surface-level connections to the SDGs
- Slow change processes

Mental Models

- Deductive, short-term thinking
- Discomfort with uncertainty/ experimentation
- Differing goals/ visions/ agendas
- Scarcity mindset

- Participate in self-report surveys (e.g. VNRs, STARS Aligned; International Institute for Sustainable Development, 2021; Kistner et al., 2020)
- Create diverse, scalable, and long-term initiatives (Bahadur & Puch, 2021)

- Assign an organizational space for sustainable development work (SDSN, 2020)
- Action-based learning and solution-oriented practices (SDSN, 2020)
- Join international and multi-stakeholder partnerships (SDSN, 2020)
 - Shared vision & trust (British Council & ACU, 2021)
 - Complementary resources (Partnership Accelerator, 2020)
